1. Radio ministry update

Gene Sharp and Andy Chafa were here with their families during the month of October. To make a long story short three new stations went on the air in General Santos City, Dumaguete City, and San Remeqio, on the other side of our island. I will write more in our next newsletter about the radio ministry. Brother Sharp is planning another trip here, most likely in the first quarter of 2024. Please pray for Brother Chafa as he continues his deputation.

2. Pastors and Workers Conference

During the first week of October IBC held its 42nd Annual Pastors and Workers Conference. It was more like a missions conference. The speakers preached about missions and most of the music was about missions. There were a lot of Filipino foreign missionaries here as well.

There were 5 missionary groups represented by one of their leaders. These ministries have had an impact on world missions. These include Asian Baptist Clearinghouse represented by Paul Byars. This missionary agency serves the 260 Independent Baptist Filipino foreign missionaries serving around the world. They were recognized for 30 years of service.

Bearing Precious Seed was represented by Al Braley, the head of operations at BPS in Milford, Ohio. In another prayer letter we plan to share more about that ministry. Bearing Precious Seed was recognized for 50 years of printing Bibles, New Testaments, and other scripture portions in over 60 languages; distributed in 130 countries.

Baptist International Missions Inc. was represented by our field director, David Harris. Becky and I have been with BIMI since we became missionaries in 1976. BIMI has served missionaries in over 100 countries for 63 years.

Independent Baptist Media was represented by Gene Sharp who started IBM in 1999. This ministry has been used by God to start radio stations around the world.



Fundamental Baptist Missions International is a ministry of First Baptist Church in Hammond, Indiana, our sending church. Pastor John Wilkerson represented this missionary agency which has been helping missionaries for 29 years.

He not only oversees the Asian Baptist Clearinghouse but pastors a church in Cavite near Manila. His church recently had over 700 people in attendance. He loves missions and has a passion to send out missionaries around the world. His physical vision is very limited, but his world vision is unlimited.





Johnny Lee Narvaez, a graduate of IBC, has a church in Qatar. The Lord is blessing him and his church in a Muslim country. He was on our staff at IBC for 28 years. His church mainly reaches overseas workers. He is very good in training men to start churches. During the 12 years he has been there, 16 of the men in his church have started churches in the Philippines, Africa, and the Middle East. Most of them have given up their well-paying jobs in Qatar, one of the wealthiest countries in the world.

One of the highlights for the ladies attending the conference was the ladies fellowship on Thursday afternoon. There was also a workshop for ladies emphasizing outreach ministries. On Thursday morning there were two split sessions for the ladies and men. Mrs. Jenny Harris, wife of David Harris, was one of the speakers and the other was Digna Toquero, wife of the late Pastor Gilbert Toquero. Brother Toquero was a beloved pastor before his home-going during Covid.

The Lord has been so good to help the pastors and workers get Bibles for many years from 3 sources. I have already mentioned Bearing Precious Seed.



The Lord gave him a gift in communicating with people when he preached. He was filled with the Holy Spirit, and he moved people when he preached.

He was passionate about the Lord's work and about pleasing his Savior. In1989 and1990 I visited his church twice. It was then that he shared his vision about starting Crown College. In the past 33 years the Lord used Crown College to send out Christian workers all over the world.

For 10 years Brother Sexton's messages have been heard by the people of Iloilo City from Monday to Friday by way of the radio station here. Many other stations in the Philippines also air his program, "Faith for the Family." It is only one way he impacted people around the world.

It is hard to believe he is gone, but he still lives.
